Death of Hon. Anson Burlingame in Russia.

ANSON BURLINGAME.

Death of the Diplomatist in St. Petersburg—Letters of Sympathy from the Czar and Czarina—Expressions from Various Localities.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Mr. BURLINGAME died at St. Petersburg shortly before noon to-day, of congestion of the lungs. The deepest sympathy is felt for his family. The Emperor and Empress of Russia have sent letters of condolence to the widow of the deceased.

PARIS, Feb. 23.—ANSON BURLINGAME, the Chinese Ambassador, died at St. Petersburg this morning, after four days' illness. His death will create a profound impression over all Europe, and particularly in Paris, where he was so well and favorably known and so much esteemed.

BOSTON, Feb. 23.—A cable dispatch received this morning announces the death of Hon. ANSON BURLINGAME at St. Petersburg yesterday. The dispatch announcing his death was received from EDWARD BURLINGAME, the eldest son of the deceased, and was addressed to Hon. ISAAC LIVERMORE, the father of Mrs. BURLINGAME, but gave no details regarding the sad event. Mr. and Mrs. BURLINGAME left Berlin Feb. 5 for St. Petersburg. By order of the Mayor of Cambridge the flags on the public buildings in that city were placed at half-mast on the announcement of Mr. BURLINGAME's death.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The first telegram received this morning, announcing the death of Minister BURLINGAME to-day in St. Petersburg, was from Minister CURTIN in that city. The second telegram was from Minister WASHBURNE, at Paris, saying he died after an illness of four days.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 23.—The evening papers publish elaborate obituaries of ANSON BURLINGAME, and there is a sincere feeling of regret at his sudden demise in the midst of his career of usefulness.
